To Set Up a College Visit: Almost every college now prefers that you set up the college visit on their website. Go to the college website, and under the admissions page, there will be a tab that says something like "set up a tour." Fill out the information, and the school will normally confirm by email.

If you plan to visit two schools on one day, make sure that each is available that day and that one can tour in the morning and the other in the afternoon before you fill out all the information. There is usually a calendar where you can check for tour availability.

I encourage every junior to set up an email account, maybe even with your parent, and do all your college/high school things through this one account. This includes signing up for tests, applying to school, setting up visits, etc. Connect this account to your cell phone so messages come to you.



Campus Visit Checklist

Visiting a college campus helps you get a sense of what a college — and life at that college — is like. This can help you decide whether the college is right for you.

GATHER INFORMATION

Find out what you need to do to apply, and see if the college's class and major offerings are what you want:

- Take part in a group information session at the admission office.
- Interview with an admission officer.
- Pick up financial aid forms.
- Sit in on a class that interests you. If classes aren't in session, just see what the classrooms are like.
- Meet a professor who teaches a subject that interests you.
- Talk to students about what they think of their classes and professors.
- Get the names and business cards of the people you meet so you can contact them later if you have questions.

EXPLORE THE CAMPUS

Get a feel for student life, and see if this college is a place where you will do well:

- Take a campus tour.
- Visit the dining hall, fitness center, library, career center, bookstore, and other campus facilities.
- Talk to current students about the college and life on campus.
- Check out the freshman dorms, and stay overnight with a student, if possible.
- Talk to the coaches of sports that you may want to play.
- Walk or drive around the community surrounding the campus.

CHECK OUT CAMPUS MEDIA

Tune in to learn what's happening on campus and what's on students' minds:

- Listen to the college radio station.
- Read the student newspaper.
- Scan bulletin boards to see what daily student life is like.
- Go to the career center and learn what services it offers.
- Browse the school's website and any campus blogs.
- Read other student publications, such as department newsletters, alternative newspapers, and literary reviews.

GET THE MOST OUT OF A CAMPUS VISIT IN 6 STEPS

1 DECIDE WHERE AND HOW

See if your school arranges group trips to colleges or if you could get a group of friends together and visit the campus. A family trip is another option and allows you to involve your family in the process.

2 PREPARE FOR YOUR VISIT

Before you set out, get a map of the college campus and pick out places of interest. Call the college's admission office to schedule a guided tour of the campus.

3 TAKE YOUR OWN TOUR

Just wandering around the campus on your own or with friends can be the best way to get a feel for what a college is like.

4 EXPLORE THE FACILITIES

Find the spots on campus where students gather or ask a student where the best place to eat is to get a feel for the character of the college. Visit the library and check out the gym or theater. Ask an admission officer if you can tour a dorm and a classroom.

5 MAKE CONNECTIONS

Talk to current students. Ask the students at the next table or sitting nearby what they like best about the college.

6 TAKE NOTES

During your visit, write down some notes about your experience. What did you see that excited you? Are there aspects of the college that you don't like? If so, what are they?

Questions to Ask During Your Visit:

ASK TOUR GUIDES/STUDENTS

- What are the best reasons to go to this college?
- What's it like to go from high school to college?
- What do you do in your free time? On the weekends?
- What do you love about this college?
- What do you wish you could change about this college?
- Why did you choose this college?
- What is it like to live here?
- What does the college do to promote student involvement in campus groups, extracurricular activities, or volunteerism?

ASK PROFESSORS

- What are the best reasons to go to this college?
- Can a student be mentored by professors, graduate students, or upperclassmen?
- How are professors rated by the college? Does the college think mentoring and meetings for project guidance are important?
- How does the college help students have access to professors outside class? Do professors join students for lunch, help with community service groups, or guide student organizations?
- How many students do research or other kinds of projects for a semester or more?

ASK THE FINANCIAL AID OFFICE

- How much has your total college cost for each student risen in the past year?
- How much do your students usually end up owing when they graduate?
- What is the average income of graduates who had the same major that interests me?
- Will my costs go up when your tuition goes up, or can we use the same tuition rate I started with so I'll know the costs for four years?
- How many students usually graduate in the major that interests me? How long do these students usually take to get their degree? In what ways does the college help students graduate in four years?

Questions to ask a College

As you start your college search, there are a few basic questions you'll want to ask yourself: Do you want to be part of a large university or a smaller college with more personal attention? Do you want to be in the inner city, a quaint college town, or somewhere in between? Are you looking for a certain academic program, or do you want to investigate the top programs at each school? One of the best ways to work through these questions is to visit schools you are considering. A college's website can tell you a lot about the school's academic programs, recreational activities, or admissions process, but, in the end, you will be leaving (and maybe living) on the college's campus, not its website.

During your visit, take advantage of all the resources you can: ask for a tour of the campus, talk with the students and professors, try the cafeteria food, and meet with the admissions staff. Remember, the main goal of the visit is to get a feel for the campus, so give yourself enough time to explore.

Here is a comprehensive list of questions you can ask during your visit. Don't feel like you have to ask them all; print the list and pick the ones that apply to you. For schools you are unable to visit, you can still use this list as a guide for your online research. If you cannot find the answers to your questions online, you can also email the college's admissions office; it will not only get you the answers, but also show the admissions staff that you are taking your college search seriously.

1. How do I apply for financial aid and scholarships?
2. What is the total cost for one year at the college, including living expenses?
3. What is there to do on the weekends?
4. What activities/organizations/sports are at the college?
5. May I choose my own roommate? What is the process?
6. Is there a career and job placement center on campus? Is there help with finalizing plans for a major and with finding a job upon graduation?
7. Are professors accessible outside of class?
8. Are campus jobs available?
9. Describe the college's resources for first-year students, computers, library, access to special equipment such as in labs, etc.
10. What kind of orientation program do you have in place for first year students?
11. What choir, band, or theater opportunities are available?
12. Are there fraternities and sororities? How many students are involved?
13. What do I need to include in my application?
14. Do you accept dual credit?
15. When can I expect to hear back from you regarding my admission status?
16. Who should I contact if I think of additional questions?
17. Are there any study sessions available? One-on-one? Group?
18. What internship, research, or service learning opportunities do you have for undergraduate students?? How many students do internships?

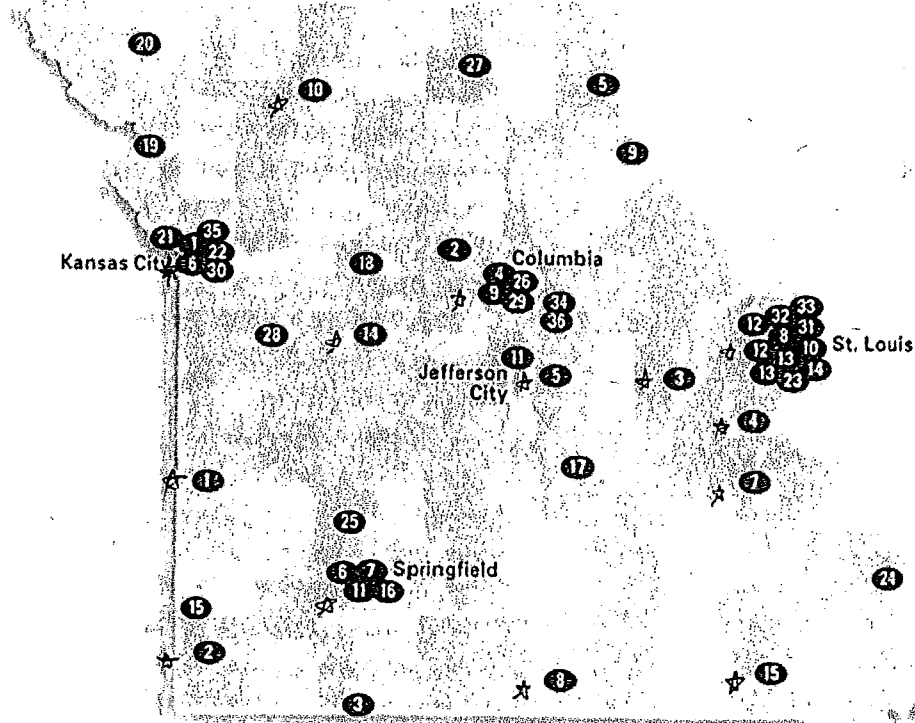
